
The North Carolina opioid settlement is part of a 56 billion-dollar national settlement with opioid manufacturers, distributors, and pharmacies accused of fueling the overdose crisis.

From the NC opioid settlement, Alamance County anticipates receiving \$16,638,635 between 2022 and 2038.

Funds from these settlements will help to bring desperately needed resources to those directly impacted by the opioid epidemic.

The NC MOA governs the allocation, use, and reporting of these funds.



- 5. Increase connections to care to improve the overall health and well-being of our community



Alamance County Overdose Data 2021-2024




Alamance County Substance Trends





ODMAP: SUSPECTED OVERDOSE SUBSTANCE



Naloxone, commonly known by the brand name Narcan, is a life-saving medication used to rapidly reverse opioid overdoses. It works by binding to the same receptors in the brain that opioids affect, effectively counteracting the life-threatening effects of overdose, such as respiratory depression. Naloxone is considered a critical tool in combating the opioid crisis. It is a safe, effective, and often first-line intervention, providing valuable time for emergency medical assistance to arrive and treat the overdose.
